### MOVING FORWARD




Lorna Bunney's Dunbar Dementia Group recognised that caring for loved ones is a massive commitment, but those subsequently bereaved can miss the companion-ship they have enjoyed as members of Dunbar dementia Network SCIO.

The charity now supports the Moving Forward group which enjoys meetings and outings together. Thanks to an East Lothian Community Rail Partnership grant, travel to and from Edin-burgh was arranged for the group where they enjoyed tea at the Balmoral Hotel.

### **AREA PLAN**

The DELAP Area Plan has been published and continues to be reviewed at business meetings. East Lothian Council asked the Area Partnership to consider what risks there may be to the delivery of this plan. This analysis was started at the recent business meeting, members are now contributing their thoughts, and a final risk assessment document will be ratified at the next meeting.



## Roads

Work to improve our roads and pathways this autumn includes:

- New pathway to **Dunbar Primary School**
- · Resurfacing at Bayswell Park.
- Resurfacing at A1087 Belhaven Road

### **Amenities**

Our Amenities Team has helped the Dunbar Shore & Harbour Neighbourhood Group to look after the planting of the seafront at Lamer Street. Most of the work of planting and maintenance is done by local volunteers, but the Amenities Team has always been willing to help where necessary. Consideration is being given to the merits of moving the boxes away from the sea wall during the winter to protect them from the worst of the storms.

It is worthy of note, at a time when there is a shortage of resources and money, that projects such as these can be delivered at zero cost through the goodwill and effort of the local people.

The Council is undertaking improvements to the Lamer Street Play Park – a project led and inspired by Max (David Maxwell) of the Dunbar Shore & Harbour Neighbourhood Group.



### **Grants**

The Bridge Centre project, funded by DELAP, this year, gets under way this month. The programme runs one day per week for ten weeks, to help students gain confidence and self esteem to secure better attainment levels.

30 September is the cut-off date for the next grant applications.

Every effort has been made to advertise the forthcoming Community Council Elections and hopefully there will be an encouraging number of people putting themselves forward as candidates.

## Special Guest from America

We welcome tourists from all over the world and this summer has been no exception. Volunteers show them round the iconic buildings on the High Street and our ancient harbours, and we are very grateful for the work that the Dunbar History Society does in this regard.

Tourists are good for our economy too as, in this case, these visitors enjoyed lunch at The Creel.

The special significance in the Texan gentleman in the smart braces, Nolan Warner, is that he is descended from one of the 10,000 who were marched down to Durham Cathedral after the 1650 Battle of Dunbar. His ancestor was one of the "lucky" ones, being then sold into slavery in Massachusetts.





When Nolan learned that the Scots' Army had been encamped on top of Doon Hill, almost certainly in 1296 and definitely in 1650, the moral of the story was clear. "Next time a Scots' Army is occupying Doon Hill it should wait for the English Army to attack, before leaving its dominant position to come down to get slaughtered!"
